Over the years, we've hosted many Governor's visits, but this is our first one online . Our Guests were from Stride Education. Big Brothers Big Sisters..





## Were you aware that Biometric checking was being used to check passengers at Australian Airports?

How are biometrics applied?

Passports, ID cards, and bank accounts.

Eligible visitors to Australia, and returning Australian citizens, are able to authenticate their identities using an automated self-service bordercontrol system called a SmartGate, which was launched in 2007. This system exclusively uses biometrics to identify

travelers through ePassports and a facialrecognition scan.

As of June 2020, the Department of Home Affairs has introduced a new biometric system, called

Enterprise Biometric Identification Services (EBIS), for visa and border processing, which will rely on facial images and fingerprints. What are the effects on citizens?

According to the Office of the Australian Information Commissioner (OAIC), any organization which scans and logs your biometric information must treat it as sensitive information and only use it for identification purposes or to ensure national safety. Any citizen that feels their data is being mishandled can lodge a complaint with OAIC.

Other common symptoms of hay fever include itchy nose and itchy, watery eyes.

It is very difficult to distinguish between the symptoms of COVID-19, influenza and a cold. If you have any infectious or respiratory symptoms (such as a sore throat, headache, fever, shortness of breath, muscle **aches, cough or runny nose) don't go to work. You need to self**-isolate and to be assessed by a medical professional. You may need testing for COVID-19.

You must not return to work until cleared by a medical professional. You need to ensure that the people you care for are protected and safe. People who have respiratory allergy symptoms such as allergic rhinitis (hay fever) and allergic asthma should stay home and get tested for COVID-19 at the onset of their symptoms and if they experience symptoms that are unexpected, seem different or worse than usual, or do not respond to their usual medication.

## LEARNING AND LIVING LEADERSHIP OUT LOUD

Kiwanis Amplify is a program designed to provide leadership skills to Kiwanians. It's almost like an MBA for Community Service Volunteers.

Participants will:

- Explore the value of servant leadership.
- Discover their personal strengths so they can lead confidently and successfully.
- Strengthen the ability to lead others in a strategic manner.
- Build and manage a strategic plan that works.
- Learn from experts as well as from peers from across the globe.
- Earn a certification of completion.

Participants will take a deep dive into eight leadership topics.

- 1. The qualities of a good leader.
- 2. Methods of communication.
- 3. Planning engaging events.
- 4. Promoting diversity, equality and inclusion throughout a team.
- 5. Working with others.
- 6. Sharing a message.
- 7. Planning for the future.
- 8. Staying focused

Interactive modules will be released weekly. Participants can work through the material at their own pace and will have the chance to interact in online discussions with cohorts moving through the curriculum. The program culminates with an inperson or online session during the 2021 Kiwanis International Convention in Salt Lake City, Utah, June 23-26, 2021.

Amplify differs from other Kiwanis Training, in that it does not target specific roles within the Kiwanis organisation, and can therefore be be used as a qualification for any leadership role in a community or professional organisation. Initially provided for Kiwanis Members only, it is planned that as the qualification receives recognition from outside organisations that it will be made available to other individuals seeking a role in leadership.

Currently the program is advertised with a participation fee of \$US200, however Australia District is investigating the possibility of a subsidy for individual participants.

#### How well do you know your Australian History.

#### Who is this?

As a child he had ridden bareback to a one-room school, following a trail frequented by the bushranger Ben Hall, and was allowed to fire a rifle that was used to kill a bandit. He rode across the Australian bush with Breaker Morant and bounced around the English countryside with Rudyard Kipling. He listened to the bluster of Winston Churchill and saw the brutality of Lord Kitchener. He was a legal advocate for Henry Lawson, and he was a pitch invader at the Sydney Cricket Ground, a tennis ace, a champion jockey and a celebrated polo player. He reported from war zones and had more battles on the sporting field than he could remember. He backed Carbine and Phar Lap, and met the great cricketers, from 'the Demon' Fred Spofforth to Don Bradman. He went to the races in France with the bawdy queen of vaudeville and flirted with the young novelist Stella Miles Franklin.

During his lifetime, he became one of the best-known Australians worldwide. As well as a poet and storyteller, he was a newspaper editor, columnist and highly regarded war correspondent, but it was his fictional heroes - the romanticised bushmen and women, heroic underdogs, tough and independent battlers tackling nature and the establishment head on - that endured, still as vivid and enchanting as they were when they first appeared, somewhere between his memories and imagination. Though he never made a fortune from his writing, he enriched the lives of his readers.

#### A Road User Tax for Electric Cars.

In case you hadn't noticed, there is currently a war of words following the Marshall Government crowing about including \$18.3 million in the upcoming SA State Budget 2020-21 to support electric vehicle uptake. What it didn't mention was that on page 26 of the State Budget Overview is that "The government is intending to introduce a road user charge for plug-in electric and zero emission vehicles. The charge will include a fixed component (similar to current registration charging) and a variable charge based on distance travelled."

SA Treasurer Rob Lucas says the tax on electric vehicles would be introduced as EV owners don't pay fuel excise and therefore make a lower contribution to the cost of maintaining road networks.

Not to be outdone, the Victorian Treasurer Tim Pallas has now come out and announced a similar tax on Saturday 21st November. A 2.5 cent/km charge would apply to electric and other zero-emission vehicles, including hydrogen vehicles, and a 2.0 cent/km charge would apply to plug-in hybrid-electric vehicles \*. "We need to recognise we have to put in place appropriate arrangements as we move to more electric vehicles and low-emissions vehicles on the network," he said.

The Victorian Government hopes to introduce the new tax in mid-2021, and it's almost certain that some other State Governments will follow.

"The South Australian Government deserves to be congratulated on taking a position of leadership and for taking on a tax reform that has for too long sat in the too-hard basket," said AAA Managing Director Michael Bradley. yesterday.

Mr. Bradley said October's federal Budget indicates Australian motorists will pay \$49.3 billion in fuel excise over the next four years, which will fund roads and other land transport infrastructure.

RACV has welcomed Victoria's new tax on electric and other zero-emissions vehicles as a frst step towards creating a fairer overall user-pays road system. RACV senior engineer vehicles, Nicholas Platt, says the EV levy lays the foundation for a fair and efficient user-pays system to replace existing federal and state road taxes.

The controversy arises because The Australia Institute (TAI) points out fuel excise is a federally levied tax that goes into general revenue and is not specifically committed to road funding. In fact this general revenue is given back to the states unequally, and the states can determine how much of it is spent on roads. Estimates put the amount spent on roads as 10 cents of the 41.8c/litre collected (ACCC 2019).

TAI says it is "disingenuous" to suggest that roads are funded by the fuel excise.

"Penalising electric car owners because they don't consume petrol that pollutes the atmosphere and our environment is absurd," said TAI SA Directory Noah Schultz-Byard. "This is, in essence, a great big new tax on not polluting."

The Federal Chamber of Automotive Industries' (FCAI's) Chief Executive Tony Weber said South Australia would be discouraging the uptake of environmentally friendly motoring and be "turning its back" on climate change.

"These vehicles offer economy wide benefits, including improved health outcomes, and will make a major contribution to improving our environmental scorecard."

The improvement in health outcomes is an important point. It's estimated just the environmental and health costs associated with emissions from petrol and diesel at around 84 cents per litre; which is far more than the fuel excise.

Victoria's planned road user tax for electric vehicles will significantly hold back clean car use, according to research that found it could lead to a 25% lower share of sales in 2050 than otherwise expected.

The Andrews government plans to impose a 2.5c a kilometre charge on electric vehicles (EVs) and a 2c/km charge on plug-in hybrid cars from July. South Australia is also planning an EV road user charge, but is yet to announce the rate.

An analysis by Dr Jake Whitehead, from the University of Queensland's Dow Centre for Sustainable Engineering Innovation, said federal government modelling had suggested EVs would be about 65% of new car sales by 2050, based on existing policies.

Modelling of the 2.5c tax rate – undertaken before Victoria made its announcement – found this would be expected to fall to 40% if the additional cost was imposed without being accompanied by new incentives. Applied nationally, this would equate to at least 4.9m fewer EV sales. Whitehead said it would likely lead to greenhouse gas emissions from transport continuing to increase given the overall number of cars on the road were forecast to rise significantly and a greater proportion would run on fossil fuels.

He said the EV per kilometre charge policy was "completely incongruent" with the states' targets of reaching net zero emissions by 2050. (*A dam Morton Environment Editor A ustralian Guardian*).
