Perhaps this is a good example of an old adage that "What Goes Around Comes Around"


So we are off and running with many more projects in the wings awaiting COVID clearance to "take off".



Our beloved Appeal remains the largest gift collection of its kind in Australia and New Zealand, and this overwhelming result will significantly helped The Salvation Army in assisting people who were in need at Christmas and will continue to do so into the year – showing families and individuals that they are not alone and that even the smallest of gifts had a meaningful impact to the lives of those doing it tough.

An enormous amount of love, passion, work and commitment goes into the Appeal and its' success year on year would not be possible without the combined efforts of everyone across the Kmart family. This includes the truly humbling response that comes from all those that participated and thought of others during the Appeal and gave what they could spare, this support is truly heart-warming. So, on behalf of the entire Kmart team and our friends at The Salvation Army, I would like to sincerely thank each and every person and business who supported the Kmart Wishing Tree Appeal. Dear Bryan,

On behalf of all of us at Children First Foundation, please accept my sincere gratitude for your recent donation.

Given the indisputable challenges of 2020 your continued support means even more than ever. Without the compassion of generous people such as yourselves the opportunity to become "one of the lucky ones", as a CFF alumni recently described it, could not have been made possible for the children and young people at the Foundation.

We have begun 2021 with 5 children under our care at the Retreat. Sonia and Ilona who are coming to the end of their journey with us are both working on the final stages of their physio and looking forward to starting their new lives. Nichole underwent successful surgery in mid-December for her severe scoliosis and is concentrating on walking straight and standing tall as her muscles adjust to her new stature. We are still hopeful that Kyla-Joy will be able to travel to Sydney in February for the surgery she needs for her burns. As she continues to grow taller the surgery to release the contracted skin on her chest and neck becomes more urgent. Christina who has been waiting patiently for a surgery date to correct her severely bowed legs is hopeful that her surgery can still go ahead in late January.

Throughout the pandemic and lockdown, we have continued our work supporting children and families in-country. Over the years we have found that our connections and networks can assist in finding solutions to situations which had seemed hopeless. Where we can do so we continue to offer help and support locally. We recently formalized agreements with local representatives in 5 of the countries we work to increase our ability to help in this way.

The disruption to borders has also not stopped requests for Children First Foundation's help. Parents, carers and doctors have continued to reach out hoping for urgent assistance for the children in their care. We have 11 children approved for surgery and awaiting visas, and a further nine at a variety of stages of case review. As the travel restrictions continue, we are assessing the more urgent cases for their eligibility for compassionate medical evacuation to Australia, for their critical medical treatment.

Your compassion and generosity will ensure that as soon as its possible we will be ready to help these children. If you would like to keep up to date on the journeys of our amazing children, then I suggest you join us on social media @childrenfirstfoundation.




Fun Day. Then on 28th September 2018, Angela took the momentous decision to join the

Controversy Corner

Contact Tracing. Necessary or an invasion of privacy?

We accept without question the fact that we need to scan the "QR" barcode displayed in all premises that supply food and drink, because we have had explained to us that this is a necessary part of the Contact Tracing procedure to protect us all from the spread of Covid 19.

Does it stop there however?

The emergence of contact-tracing apps to stem the spread of Covid-19 back in March last year was met with scepticism and mistrust, and perhaps with good reason. Just this week, Singapore's TraceTogether app updated its privacy policy to allow the police to request information from the app for criminal investigations. The Guardian

While numerous contact-tracing systems—and their long-term privacy implications—have been introduced around the world, participation has been mostly voluntary. But a worrying new trend is mandated contact tracing in private workplaces. A wave of new social-distance monitoring and worker-interaction tools are being trialed in factories and warehouses in the U.S., and employees have to opt in or run the risk of losing their jobs.

You are all aware of the largely failed Australian COVIDSafe App., but a much more effective method of contact tracing is the use of a smartwatch that monitors its surroundings for other devices in the vicinity. Weak signals are left alone, but if a watch detects a strong signal for more than 15 minutes, it sends a notification of the interaction to a database in the cloud. The company Radient RFID which produces these watches, claims its solution results in a 65% decrease in employee interactions within one week of implementation.

The smartwatch is able to send automated social-distancing compliance notifications while also relaying back data to a dashboard that managers have access to. The company says it's enabled anonymous device-interaction history, allowing for contact tracing in the workplace.

But how anonymous can it be if the interactions can be tied back to specific workers?

Radiant RFID has no shortage of takers. The Ford Motor Company is one of its clients, with Radiant RFID claiming it's sold more than 10,000 smartwatches in the U.S. and that they're struggling to keep up with demand.

Other than Bluetooth devices, thermal imaging is another category of equipment being used to detect and quell the possible spread of Covid-19 in the workplace. Dominated by companies such as Flir and Optris, the thermal-imaging market is expected to grow to 4.6 billion USD by 2025, or a compound annual growth rate of 6.2%. Thermal-imaging cameras are used for precise readings of body temperature and other leading indicators of a possible infection. Flir, for example, counts the Pentagon as one of its clients.

While such enhanced interaction-tracing apps and body-temperature sensors strive to keep workplaces free of Covid-19, the fact is they're gathering an immense amount of healthcare and personally identifiable information with little to no oversight about how that data is stored, managed, or repurposed.

How your company might track you.

It's also not a stretch to say that such workplace tracking mechanisms will remain in place even after the elimination of the virus. Companies that find employees interacting with each other too frequently could send out automated warnings, reminding them to get back to work. Thermal imaging sensors could also increase in technological sophistication, allowing management to use heatmaps to determine how long employees spend at their desks and whether they're idling on company time. Smartwatches such as those sold by Radiant RFID can be used to track things like heart rates and location history; while these are turned off for now, what's to prevent companies from making them mandatory?


