HELP KIDS LIVE THEIR BEST LIVES

It's no secret Kiwanians love kids. We want to see all kids safe, happy and healthy. But after nearly a year of a global pandemic, new struggles have emerged — and some old ones have become even more important. From honouring those working the COVID-19 front lines to protecting kids from online threats, we're highlighting the people, projects and ideas helping kids live the best life possible.

Keeping kids safe from online threats is a top priority.

When the World Health Organization officially declared COVID-19 a pandemic one year ago, a worldwide transition to remote work and education occurred for many almost overnight. And while we were preoccupied with adapting careers and schoolwork to a virtual experience, online predators suddenly had an influx of distracted, stressed and overwhelmed children, tweens and teens who could be accessed at the click of a key.

What can you do?

Activate parental controls.

Your cable system, internet and cell phone providers most likely give you the ability to limit the types of content your children can access and actions they can take. So do some of the most popular social media apps. Contact your service provider or plug the name of the service or app along with "parental controls" into an internet search engine for instructions. You can also consider a free or fee-based monitoring service that will track your child's activities and alert you to concerns.

To safeguard against threats like phishing, (an email that resembles one from a seemingly familiar site or contact, like a bank, online shop or friend or family member, but containing a link to malicious software), have candid, age-appropriate conversations with your child, stressing that while the internet brings many positive benefits, it also comes with dangers just like "real life." Even young children can and should learn this lesson.

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Building greener roads.

City of Glen Eira initiative to help combat Climate Change



We're building greener roads with recycled plastic and glass, as well as reclaimed asphalt pavement (RAP) in our annual road resurfacing works.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Margaret Esakoff said in its continued effort to make Glen Eira a more sustainable place to live, Council recently trialled the use of PolyPave, also known as green asphalt, in its resurfacing works.

"Green asphalt contains a range of recycled materials, including plastic, recycled glass and RAP," she said.

"We recently trialled green asphalt on three streets in Bentleigh East — Brosnan Road, Dega Avenue and Brosa Avenue".

"Around 15,000 two-litre plastic bottles and 110,000 glass bottles were recycled into the road".

"The trial not only decreased landfill by 200 tonnes — the equivalent of 3,000 wheelie bins of waste glass and plastic — but also reduced carbon emissions by 1,260 kilograms."

In another initiative to fight Climate Change, Glen Eira Council is introducing New electric vehicles in spite of the Andrews Government's proposed new tax on them.



Two new electric vehicles have been added to our fleet. 'Bev' is a Hyundai Ioniq and 'Zoe' is a Renault Zoe. A charging station has been installed at Glen Eira Town Hall, which uses renewable energy from Town Hall's solar panels. Council's Sustainability Advisory Committee Chairperson Cr Simone Zmood said it's an exciting time for electric vehicles in Australia, as there are more charging stations and

a bigger range of models.

"The electric vehicles will be used by Council officers throughout the municipality," she said. "The range of 300 kilometres is suited to an urban environment and our operational needs".

"Purchasing the electric vehicles is part of Council's commitment to strong action on climate change, and reducing carbon emissions from Council operations."

Electric vehicles can even be charged in a regular home power socket. There are now 28 electric vehicle passenger models in Australia. By the end of 2021, it's expected another six models will be available.

Electrifying our fleet is just one way that we'll meet our ambitious new target of zero net emissions for Council operations by 2025 *Taken from March Sustainability E-News*

(seen in mock-up form at bottom right) is:


- Take a Book or Two

Controversy Corner

COVID 19 Vaccination Certification and more on Contact Tracing.

At the time of penning this report, a debate is raging over the need for some form of certification to prove that the holder has been vaccinated once vaccinations begin in Australia. This has been exacerbated by reports that certain businesses such as Airlines will require proof of Vaccination before providing their service. An ABC report (Sun 7 Feb) stated that the Federal Government vaccination plan confirms that Australians will be able to access proof through their mobile phones that they have received the jab. Good, but how will that work?

Government Services Minister Stuart Robert said anyone who received a coronavirus vaccine would have it recorded on the Australian Immunisation Register.

The record will then be made available on the "MyGov" website or the Express Plus Medicare app, where a person's total immunisation history is listed, or a paper version can be printed out.

Labor leader Anthony Albanese argued the Government had a poor track record when it came to delivering COVID-19 support services online.

"We know that they didn't get the [COVIDSafe] tracing app right," he said.

"So they need to, as the rollout of the vaccine occurs, make sure that they absolutely get it right because our economy, as well as our health, depends on it."

Malcolm Turnbull tweeted an excellent solution, (see tweet at left), however poor Malcolm still thinks that what NSW does the rest of Australia follows. He's right that the "Service NSW App" has proven particularly

Morrison government readies rollout of vaccine certificates

The Australian government is finalising the rollout of digital and hard copy COVID-19 vaccine certificates.

effective in contact tracing in NSW, because it incorporates QR scanning that has been adopted by almost all businesses in NSW, and provides immediate centralised recording of everyone who has visited a hotspot, so that authorities can make contact with them.

In September the NSW Government released an update to their Service NSW app to allow people to check in to a venue (including Taxis) using a QR code. By 30th October 13,500 businesses had already downloaded a QR code, and it's now almost universal. Well Yes! Malcolm that works and has been proven to be very effective, hence would be an ideal platform for records of Vaccination.

What Malcolm failed to recognise is that south of the border, we have a "Gold Standard" COVID tracing and quarantine system.

Once Victoria came out of stage 4 lockdown, Daniel Andrews announced that the Victorian Government is developing a specific QR code check-in system that hospitality and retail stores will be asked to use so data can be easily linked to the state's new contact tracing system to quickly track COVID cases (*The Guardian 29th Oct 2020*). The Victorian premier, Daniel Andrews, said the state will move to a universal QR code check-in system currently being

developed that will integrate into the Salesforce contact tracing system.

When asked why the government wasn't adopting the government apps

When asked why the government wasn't adopting the government apps used in the ACT and New South Wales, Andrews said the new system had to be designed to integrate into the new contact tracing system. He rejected criticism the system should have been ready for this week's reopening.

So what happened? Four months later, I downloaded the "Service Victoria App" (at right) and I have yet to find any Victorian retailers using it. Before Service Victoria was available, retailers to comply with the tracking regulations, had to use other third party services like Kounta,

Covidcomply, Visitsafe, Guesthq, Medallia, and Guesttrack, whilst Big companies such as Woolworths and Kmart have implemented their own check-in service. The ideal system requiring a single login, and then simply scan and forget, has been replaced by a system that requires you to re-enter your name, phone number and email address everytime you visit a new retailer. Then the clincher is that it can then take up to 24 hrs before the record of your visit reaches the contact tracing department. If the so called Gold Standard for tracking and quarantine was so good, then surely the Andrews Government would have had sufficient confidence in its ability to contain an outbreak with such a small number of infections without the need to inflict a third lockdown on and already suffering Victorian population.

You also have to question why a 51 year old hotel (opened in 1971 as the Airport Travelodge, hence not exactly built for purpose), would be used to isolate such a highly transmissible disease as COVID-19?


