when we already donate to the Kiwanis Australia Charitable Foundation? " Fortunately Betty D'Amore KCF Australia District Chair has answered this question in responding to another question.

Do any of our donations to KCF come back to Australia?

1. Club Club Grant Program.

Clubs can apply. Many of our club signature projects meet the criteria for a club grant. A link to the Guide to Club Grants is available at www2.kiwanis.org. For timelines and criteria for applications, go to 'Impact and programs,' then 'Club Grant Program.'

2. Disaster Relief Grant Program.

Clubs can apply for funds in the event of a disaster such as floods or bushfires. Please note that there are very specific eligibility requirements. Funds are granted only for crucial immediate needs. Again, more information is available at www2.kiwanis.org

3. The third way in which funds come back to Australia is via the District **Grant Fund**.

Each year KCF returns 15% of undesignated funds donated by the district in the form of a District Grant. Again there are specific requirements, but Australia District determines how the grant will be spent.

However clubs can propose projects. Again more information is available at www2.kiwanis.org

Last year the grant funded the very successful Book Bag Project at convention which saw Aktion Club members working with convention attendees to fill book bags. Aktion Club members then distributed the bags to needy children.

This year the grant helped fund the Roma Mitchell Secondary College Key Club project to supply Birthing Kits to families in countries where there is no access to hygienic facilities for women giving birth. A report on this great project will be in the next Australia Kiwanis magazine.

So, thank you for asking. Again, I stress that I am always happy to answer your questions or to assist you with applications.

Happy Birthday Gus. 94 years old on 19th September.

Angus William MacFarlane joined the Kiwanis Club of Moorabbin on 16th April 1970, and became the charter Secretary of the club in July 1970. Gus and Ena had recently moved down to Melbourne from Sydney (Collaroy Plateau), and ended up living next door to Ron and Dorothy Erskine, who had also moved down from Sydney. Gus soon convinced Ron to Join Moorabbin as well. In those days Gus was the National Sales Manager of Alsco Linen services, and later became their General Manager. Gus developed a range of incontinence products for the elderly, and achieved industry wide acceptance for this work.

Gus has always led an active life, and was a keen sailor in Sydney as well as a skier, but most of all he enjoyed walking and trekking. He has travelled around the world trekking in the Himalayas, the UK and the Canadian Rockies, and it was on the latter that he met Ena, who became his life and trekking partner. Gus's other love was singing, and it was common after most Kiwanis social evenings to find a group around the piano involved in a good old sing-along. It wasn't long before Gus's Baritone drowned out all the others. He joined the Victorian Welsh Male Choir in 1988, and toured extensively with the group. In

1994 Gus was invited to join the Melbourne Welsh Male Choir. As a member of this voluntary organization, Gus and the choir sang in many countries around the world winning awards and great recognition for Australia. In retirement. Gus continued his voluntary work with Kiwanis, and on behalf of the Kingston City Council, became a voluntary driver for elderly folk who have medical appointments requiring transport to and from. Often the folk Gus drives are younger than himself, but unable to drive themselves.



Where do you get your news?

On 25 June this year, Norman Zhou in the Australian Guardian, reported that "Dozens of local and regional papers are printing their final front page this week, as widespread cuts across regional journalism hit papers with more than a hundred years of history". He goes on to report that this is not the end of the story, as journalists are claiming that the closure of regional and local papers would leave "thousands of stories untold". Also in the same week the ABC also announced it would cut 250 jobs and drop the 7:45am news radio bulletin.

You've probably been effected by this already, with the discontinuance of your local newspaper, plus the demonstrably reduction in the size of your daily newspaper (if you still purchase one). Critics are already pointing to the degradation of the standard of news reporting in the printed press, and blaming this on reduced news staff numbers, and lack of editorial oversight.

The Australian media organisations now claim that this is the result of their public moving to gather their news from on-line sources, who in turn gather heir content from the producers of the news, without paying them and that this has resulted in the media's reduced ability to cover their own costs. The Australian Federal Government obviously agrees, and in a move that seeks to have these organisations paid for the content they generate

"The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) has been instructed by the Australian government to create a mandatory code of conduct to instruct tech giants on how to share the revenue they generate from using content produced by news outlets, which Australian Treasurer Josh Frydenberg said seeks to "level the playing field". According to ABC News Australia, the code will address how the digital giants are to share advertising revenue earned from news, how original sources of news content are to be favored on search page results and the sharing of data with news organizations.

Following an inquiry into the impact of digital platforms on the Australian media landscape, the ACCC was originally requested to develop a voluntary code of conduct back in December 2019, which aimed to have Facebook and Google negotiate with the Australian news media on how to pay for the content they were benefiting from.

Initial negotiations proved unsuccessful, and the ACCC advised the Federal Government that an agreement was "unlikely". Now, as the coronavirus pandemic continues to debilitate the advertising revenue of Australian news outlets, the government has pushed forward by requesting the code now be mandatory, with a proposal due by the end of July.

The new code will include penalties and obligations for how to resolve disputes between Australian media companies and the tech giants. It will also encompass sites other than Facebook and Google, including Instagram and Twitter, which also benefit from content created by news sites.

A similar code of conduct was requested by the competition authority in France earlier this month, which asked Google to work with news organizations and pay to display extracts on its news and search result pages.

Frydenberg added that "It's only fair that those that generate content get paid for it". Jasmine Gearie 20 April 2020 (TechRadar).

Sounds fine doesn't it, but here's the kicker.

Social media giant Facebook has come out against proposed Australian media laws, issuing a statement today via its newsroom threatening to remove all instances of news appearing on its social media platforms in Australia if the country passes the recently drafted legislation.

Google has recently taken a similar stance against the draft law, targeting Australian internet users with warnings about claimed 'dangers' to Google services if the legislation is passed. Those alerts have appeared on the main Google search homepage, as well as across YouTube. The company also published a dedicated blog post on the matter. Harry Domanski 01 September 2020 TechRadar.

Watch this space. Will our Government fight this, and do you think they should?
